Practitioner Notes

In this series, learners will perform digital technology tasks to develop and express knowledge for managing learning. They will explore ways of being an independent, self-directed learner.

In Tasks L1 to L3, learners will have opportunities to integrate online information with their own experiences to discuss how to manage learning and where to find programs, resources, help and support. Task L1 is a series of six possible activities where learners can explore aspects of how to manage learning, how learning makes people powerful and how learners can make change. In these activities, learners will create a body of writing that they can use in Task L2 and L3. Tasks L2 and L3 offer possibilities for how learners might share the information they have gathered and their ideas and opinions about learning.

In the Tasks L4 to L6, learners will do activities to prepare for independent and online learning. Task L5: Open an email account does not have to be done first but some of the following activities require learners to log into a course that requires an email to register (AlphaPlus and the Learning Hub).

You can use these tasks as a series or use one or more of the tasks independently. The tasks are designed as ideas to get you started – please bend, spindle and mutilate as you wish. Adapt these ideas to suit the needs and goals of the learners with whom you are working.

The tasks in this series are designed according to the principles that:

- All learners, regardless of their reading, writing, and technology skill levels should have access to learning opportunities using digital technology.
- Digital technology tasks should draw from reading content that all learners can work with, if possible, to assure that learners can share learning experiences even if they are involved in tasks requiring various levels of digital technology skills.

In many cases, the information that learners need in order to complete tasks is available on video and learners can access the information regardless of reading level.

In cases where learners can access information by reading OR using audio and video, the reading tasks are Level 1 where indicated, but often the analysis that learners are asked to do in the suggested *Communicating Ideas* tasks require them to connect, evaluate and /or integrate ideas and information at a higher level.

You will see suggestions for *Communicating Ideas* tasks that you can adapt to different the levels. The levels in the task overview reflect the level of writing competency *needed* to complete the activities in that task, but instructors can adapt the writing activities to meet the needs of specific learners. Instructors can choose how learners will present how they have connected, evaluated and /or integrated ideas and information – in writing, in class discussions, by creating videos or recordings, etc.

These activities provide learners opportunities to *Manage Learning* in the following ways:

- Recognize and express when one does not know something
- Accept new learning challenges
- Willing to work independently
- Take initiative
- Take risks in learning situations
- Manage time
- Use learning strategies: follow instructions, take notes
- Identify ways to remember information and reinforce learning
- Sequence activities in multi-step tasks
- Adapt to instructional approaches
- Transfer skills and strategies to different contexts
- Identifies multiple sources of information to complete tasks
- Evaluate the quality and comprehensiveness of multiple resources to complete tasks

These tasks include blended learning activities. A blended learning approach combines face-to-face instruction with technology-mediated instruction. In blended learning, digital technology is a means to an end. Instructors and tutors make appropriate choices within a blended learning environment about digital and non-technology tasks.

Use digital technology tasks are integrated into lessons where other competencies are practised. Learners are required to perform *Find and Use Information* and *Communicate Ideas and Information* tasks online or offline, using non-technology related resources.

These tasks are not a series of independent learning activities. Learners may do some of the online activities independently but they will be required to share their findings, evaluations, analyses and opinions with the group.

It is recommended that instructors familiarize themselves with the websites before asking learners to use them. In some cases instructors may want to use screenshots of web pages to create a navigation guide for learners. In general, learners usually need only a few instructions about navigation menus before they are able to use them with ease. Some learners may benefit from guide sheets for their first few forays into online learning but soon people will find their own ways of doing things.

When learners are online in a computer lab, some will start clicking on everything right away and exploring independently while others wait until they receive instructions or support. This can be challenging for instructors as learners end up in all kinds of different places within seconds. It can also make some learners anxious as they feel that they are falling behind. Start a class by acknowledging the people that want to jump right in. Assure them that they will have a chance to do that soon and ask them to wait for 5 minutes or so until you can relay all the instructions and answer all the questions so that everyone has the same information to start.

Sometimes in a computer-assisted lesson it is difficult to see exactly what people are doing and what outcomes are being achieved. All interactions are being mediated through a machine and this can take a little while to get used to. Instructors may find that they have to use their assessment-by-observation skills a little differently. Because using digital technology is a means to an end, instructors and learners can make assessments based on outcomes rather than the process. For example, an assessment question might be “Did I find what I was looking for?” rather than “Do I understand how to use the browser back button?”

One of the challenges of working with learners on using digital technology tasks is that learners in one class will usually have a wide range of digital technology competencies. The activities that relate to *Find and Use Information* tasks in Tasks L1 to L3 are designed so that learners with a higher level of digital technology competency do some work independently while instructors and tutors support those that need more guidance.

Task L1 Learn about adult learning (level 1)

Perform simple digital tasks according to a set procedure

In this task, learners will

- Use a specific website to find information.
 - Follow simple prompts.
 - Follow described steps to complete tasks.
 - Interpret brief text and icons.
 - Locate specific functions and information.
- Use navigation buttons and menus to perform simple searches and access information online.
- Complete online learning activities.
- Copy relevant information on a template form (optional).
- Use information from websites to develop knowledge and confidence for discussing, planning and meeting personal learning needs and goals.

Part 1 – Informal Learning

1. Ask learners about their return to formal learning.

Possible pre-activity questions:

What does it mean to be an adult learner?

What made you join a learning program?

What skills have you learned outside of school?

What do you want to learn in school?

2. Provide learners with a link to [The Learning Beacon, Issue 3, Informal Learning](#).
3. Ask learners to listen to / read the article.
4. Do the vocabulary quizzes.
5. Do the writing activity.

Notes

- If necessary, use print outs and screen captures of relevant web pages to help learners find and identify the parts of the page and use the navigational features.

(Play. Pause. Rewind. Elmsdale Lumber Comapany. Learning Activities. Print. Close.)

- Teach learners how to use the browser back button.

Part 2 – Overcoming barriers

1. Ask learners about their return to formal learning.

Possible pre-activity questions:

Did you find it hard to come back to school?

What made it challenging to get back into formal learning?

2. Provide learners with a link to [The Learning Beacon, Issue 1, Adult Learner Fights for her Education](#).
3. Ask learners to listen to / read the article.
4. Do the “It’s Your Turn” writing activity.

Here are the questions for the writing activity:

Did you find it hard to go back to school?

What made you decide to return to school?

Was it hard to get back into formal learning?

What advice would you give to those who are thinking of going back to school?

Notes

- If necessary, use print outs and screen captures of relevant web pages to help learners find and identify the parts of the page and use the navigational features.

(Play. Pause. Rewind. The Book. Next Page. It’s Your Turn. Print. Close.)

- Teach learners how to use the browser back button.

Part 3 – Managing life and learning

1. Ask learners about what gets in the way of learning.
Possible pre-activity questions:
Do you ever feel like giving up?
Do you ever feel as if making time for learning is impossible?
2. Provide learners with a link to [The Learning Beacon, Issue 7, Learning and Taking Care of Yourself](#).
3. Ask learners to listen to / read the article.
4. Ask learners to do the Stress-o-meter and/or
5. Ask learners to read about Taking Care and/or
6. Ask learners to write an affirmation for the Affirmation Bank and send it in and/or
7. Create a template or question sheet where learners can list their ideas for Taking Care:
 - Give yourself a break
 - Connect with others
 - Explore and express your feelings
 - Have fun
 - Nurture your spirit.

Notes

- If necessary, use print outs and screen captures of relevant web pages to help learners find and identify the parts of the page and use the navigational features.

(Play. Pause. Rewind. Print. Close. Animation. Introduction. Stress-o-meter - Feelings and Thoughts, Behaviours, Physical Symptoms. Taking Care - Give yourself a break, Connect with others, Explore and express you feeling, Have fun, Nurture your spirit. Affirmation Bank.)
- Teach learners how to use the browser back button.

Part 4 – Learn about the Learning and Violence website

1. Ask learners about what other things can make it difficult for people to learn.
Possible pre-activity question:
Do past experiences make it difficult for people to learn?
2. Provide learners with a link to [The Learning Beacon, Issue 8, Learner Kit - Helping Myself Learn](#).
3. Ask learners to listen to / read the article – Parts 1, 2 and 3.
4. Ask learners to do the [Google](#) search and navigate to the [Changing Education](#) site.
5. Ask learners to choose a door to enter and explore what the learners have to say, the activities and the resources. (Some of these activities may be Level 2 and 3 activities).
6. Ask learners to do a Words or [Pictures](#) (Level 2) activity from the section they looked at and

share it with the class.

7. Ask learners to do the Music activity and find a song on [YouTube](#) that reflects how they feel about learning or how they would like to feel about learning. (Level 2)
8. Create a template or question sheet where learners can list their ideas for Helping Myself Learn.

Possible questions:

What door did you open?
Did you learn anything new there?
How will use what you learned in your life?
Will you do anything differently?
Do you want to open any other doors?

9. Ask learners to start a learning journal. This can be a private journal or one where you read and respond to the entries.

Notes

→ If necessary, use print outs and screen captures of relevant web pages to help learners find and identify the parts of the page and use the navigational features.

(Play. Pause. Rewind. Part 1 2 3. Print. Close.)

→ Teach learners how to use the browser back button.

Part 5 – Learning is Power

1. Ask learners about learning and power.

Possible pre-activity questions:

Do you agree with the statement, “Learning is power.”?
How is learning power for you?
What makes learning powerful?
What makes learners powerful?

2. Provide learners with a link to [Learning is Power](#).
3. Create a template or question sheet where learners can list their ideas for Learning is Power.

Possible questions:

What doors does learning open for you?
How are learners in your program powerful?
What do you think helps people learn best?
Does your program do all of those things?
Can your program do all of those things?

Notes

→ If necessary, use print outs and screen captures of relevant web pages to help learners find and identify the parts of the page and use the navigational features.

→ Teach learners how to use the browser back button.

Part 6 – Making change

1. Ask learners about learning and power.

Possible pre-activity questions:

Is there anything about adult learning you would like to change?

What about others in the program? Is there anything that they would like to change?

How could you find out?

2. Provide learners with a link to the video [Inviting Neighbors to Participate in Community Development](#).
3. Ask learners what they think of this approach and what they think of these questions.
4. Create a template or question sheet where learners can survey other program participants using the questions from the video or a set of questions

Possible questions:

How long have you been coming to this literacy program?

Name 2 or 3 things that you really like about your program.

If you had a magic wand, what is one thing you would change about your program?

What can you contribute to making that change?

If others had a similar vision for change, would you be willing to work with them?

Notes

- If necessary, use print outs and screen captures of relevant web pages to help learners find and identify the parts of the page and use the navigational features.
- Teach learners how to use the browser back button.

Task L2 Create a blog (level 3)

Experiment and problem-solve to perform multistep digital tasks

In this task, learners will

- Use an index to find to find information on web pages.
 - Experiment and problem-solve to achieve the desired results.
 - Manage unfamiliar elements (e.g. vocabulary, context, topic) to complete tasks.
 - Make inferences to interpret icons and text.
 - Perform searches using keywords.
 - Select appropriate software when required by the task.
 - Identify sources, evaluate and integrate information.
 - Customize software interfaces (e.g. toolbar, homepage settings).
- Predict where to find information online.
- Use navigation buttons and menus to perform simple searches and access information online to perform simple searches and access information online.
- Work with a variety of web interfaces.
- Create a blog and/or blog posts.
- Create a web interface that makes online information accessible to others.

Learning Activities

Part 1 – Learn about blogs

1. Ask learners what they know about blogs.

Possible pre-activity questions:

- Who reads blogs?
- What is your favourite blog?
- Who has a blog?
- Who can describe what a blog is?

2. Go to one of the online dictionaries and/or Encyclopedia.com and look up the word blog.
3. Go to You Tube and look up “What is a blog?” ([What is a blog?](#))
4. Discuss what blogs can do and how an Adult Learning Blog could help participants in your program.
5. Read about other Ontario Learners’ experiences with blogs

6. Go to the *Blogger* [Getting Started](#) page and read [Create a blog](#); [Write a post](#); and [Add an image](#)
7. Go to the *Blogger* [YouTube channel](#) and watch [How to Create a Blog on Blogger](#); [Choose who can read and edit your blog](#); and any other videos you think will be helpful.

Part 2 – Plan a blog

1. Using the information gathered and the writing created in *Task L1 – Learn about adult learning*, decide what information is most important for most learners in programs.

Possible questions:

What do you wish you had known before you started?

What were the things that were surprising to you when you started?

What helps you most to manage learning?

2. Ask learners to write or revise short articles for new learners to post on the blog.

Part 3 – Create a blog

1. Ask learners to think about what makes websites easy-to-use and interactive. Ask them to think about what elements they would like to add to the blog to help other learners use the information there.

→ Learners can use the “[labels](#)”

(<http://support.google.com/blogger/bin/answer.py?hl=en&answer=44498>) feature to index their posts. This will give them practice thinking about producing keywords and can serve to deepen their understanding of how keywords work (see Share or collaborate using digital technology → Community Resources, Level 2 Do a keyword search).

→ Program participants can add comments about their own experiences with the resources. (A *Level 1 Use Digital Technology* task could be to add a comment to the community resources blog.)

→ You can add the “[reactions](http://buzz.blogger.com/2008/11/reactions-easily-engage-your-readers.html)” (<http://buzz.blogger.com/2008/11/reactions-easily-engage-your-readers.html>) feature so that readers can rate the post or the resource.

→ You can add “[polls](http://support.google.com/blogger/bin/answer.py?hl=en&answer=42077)” (<http://support.google.com/blogger/bin/answer.py?hl=en&answer=42077>) to the blog to elicit opinions from other program participants.

→ You can add audio support for program participants with [voz.me](#) or [Voki](#). (to see more about Voki, go to the *AlphaPlus Voki spotlight page*.)

Possible Follow-up Activities

→ Interview learners, instructors and coordinators at your program and add that information to the blog post using text, pictures, audio and/or video.

2. Create images that fit your article. Find out how many people have digital cameras - you can use camera phones. Take the cameras out into your community and take pictures that will help tell the story.

Part 4 – Write the story

1. Share the photos with the class and get feedback. Choose the best photos and add them to the storyboard.
2. Write a draft of your article and include the pictures.

Part 5 – Get feedback and revise

1. Share the draft with a reader. Can your reader easily identify the message?
2. Revise your photo story based on the feedback from your reader.
3. Create a final layout of photographs and words using software such as [Comic Life](#), PowerPoint or Word.
4. Write an “Artist’s Statement” to explain who created the photo story and why.

Part 3 – Practice using email

- Provide learners with a link to [Sending and receiving email](#) to help guide them through the process of sending and receiving email, learning about using cc (carbon copy) and bcc (blind carbon copy) and organizing email messages.
- Send an email to all the learners. Ask them a general information question and ask them to reply by email. Ask them to “reply to all.”
- Send an email to all the learners. Ask them a personal information question (such as their birth date or middle name – nothing too personal in case they “reply to all” by mistake) and ask them to reply by email. Ask them to “reply” only to you.

10. Create a template or question sheet where learners fill in the course they chose and why. Here are some possible questions:

Which courses would you like to take? Name your three top choices.

Why did you choose these courses?

Does this course fit with your goals or do you have another reason for taking it?

Did this course make you think about new goals?

Would this course fit with your current schedule or do you have to wait until another time?

Could you do this course with the computer you currently have available or will you need to arrange some technology support?

Does this course fit with the ways you like to learn or will you need to take on some new challenges?

What skills and knowledge will you bring to this course that will help you?

What skills and knowledge do you bring to the course that will help the other learners?
